The UNHCR-WFP Joint Hub Country Support Brief

Egypt hosts more than **941,600** registered refugees and asylum seekers from **61** nationalities. The largest group are Sudanese, followed by Syrians (123,000), South Sudanese (50,000), and Eritreans (43,000). Egypt is currently the largest host country for Sudanese refugees fleeing the conflict. Between 2024 and September 2025, the number of Sudanese refugees and asylum seekers registered with UNHCR rose from 200,000 to over 795,000 people (UNHCR, 2025). Refugees in Egypt primarily live in **urban areas** that offer some livelihood opportunities, mainly in **Greater Cairo**, **Alexandria**, **Al-Sharqia**, **Damietta**, and other northern and eastern cities.

JOINT HUB SUPPORT

The Joint Hub started supporting UNHCR and WFP in Egypt in June 2023, following a scoping mission and a formal request from the Country Operations. From 2023 to 2025, the Joint Hub led and coordinated collaborative efforts aimed at assessing refugee needs through a "one refugee" approach—regardless of nationality. The joint approach sought to:

- Inform targeting and prioritization of basic needs assistance;
- Support longer-term socio-economic inclusion planning; and

• Strengthen accountability to affected people (AAP).

In addition to the 2023 scoping mission, the Joint Hub conducted an **online mission in February 2025** focused on the quantitative and qualitative assessments that will define the **targeting methodologies** and guide future programming.

KEY THEMATIC DELIVERABLES

1. JOINT ASSESSMENT AND ANALYSIS

The joint assessment (2024–2025) was conducted in partnership with the **Central Agency for Public Mobilization and Statistics (CAPMAS**). It comprised quantitative and qualitative exercises led by WFP and UNHCR, with technical support from the Joint Hub.

The Joint Hub played a key role in:

- Building the sampling methodology, questionnaires, and logistical arrangements;
- Providing technical guidance during data collection; and
- Conducting high-frequency data quality checks to address issues in real time.
- Analysing the quantitative and qualitative data

The quantitative data collection, conducted by CAPMAS under the guidance of the Joint Hub and led by Country Offices, was completed in **December 2024**, covering **3,349 households**.

In **February 2025**, staff from both agencies conducted **19 focus group discussions** (**FGDs**) nationwide to collect qualitative data. The triangulation of both data sets forms the foundation for the **targeting methodology** design.

Findings are documented in the Egypt Vulnerability Assessment Report (EVAR 2025), available in English and Arabic. As of December 2025, the Arabic version is pending endorsement by CAPMAS and the Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

A technical brief details the Joint Hub's support to the development of the targeting methodology, including calculations for the Minimum Expenditure Basket (MEB) and Survival Minimum Expenditure Basket (SMEB). As of November 2025, Country Offices are conducting additional technical analyses to confirm the final targeting approach.

2. ACCOUNTABILITY TO AFFECTED PEOPLE (AAP)

The Joint Hub provided significant support for AAP-related activities, including drafting a **joint communication strategy**, mapping existing **feedback mechanisms** and developing **Standard Operating Procedures** (SOPs) to strengthen the **joint appeals process**.

3. SELF-RELIANCE

In 2023, the Joint Hub established a technical working group on livelihoods and self-reliance to facilitate joint discussions and define self-reliance pathways for refugees. The group also explored:

- Opportunities for harmonizing WFP and UNHCR humanitarian cash assistance:
- A progressive alignment between humanitarian targeting and national social protection programmes; and
- The integration of a social protection lens into strategic planning.

However, these discussions were temporarily put on hold pending agreement on the joint targeting approach.
